The "father" of Modern-day Telemark Skiing of Steve Barnett

...... EXPLORE: Steve Barnett is no longer the name it once was in the telemarking word. Have you faded from the limelight?

BARNETT: Let's say I'm retired from gurudom. All I ever intended to do was to do show people what was possible using one system of skiing. In the small pond of skiing, I had an influence, I accomplished what I wanted.

EXPLORE: So who are the current gurus?

BARNETT: Everyone's a guru. If you're a great skier or write a book you're suddenly a guru. That's good because we can learn from all of them. Some can help us ski fast, others teach us to ski bumps, still others can help us negotiate difficult snow conditions. All these good skiers help account for the dramatic improvement in the general level of skiing.

EXPLORE: In some respects you'll come out of "retirement" this year when your new book THE BEST SKI TOURING IN AMERICA is released this fall. Tell us about the book.

BARNETT: The book is a natural extension of why I learned to telemark - to ski the backcountry. To me the turn was always a means to an end. Like my first the boo, I hope this one will open people's eyes to what's possible. I also hope it will expand many skiers'horizons by introducing them to the diversity of experiences possible in North America. It's hard to compare a ski trip in Baja to another in Alaska. Skiing on the Gaspè Peninsula is completely different than the icefields of British Columbia. Still, all the tours in this book offer unique settings and the possibilities for great skiing. They are wonderful tours.

EXPLORE: After this book, what's next?

BARNETT: I want to write books on biological and zoological subjects. I have a strong science background and always presumed that's where my career would be - other things just got in the way. That's not to say I'll give up skiing. I love to ski, whether it's on downhill slopes, tracks, or in the backcountry. I just never intended to make it my career.
